Travelling to India is like entering a different world. It is like having all your senses suddenly turned up to 11. This includes the heat, the smell, the colour, the busyness and the traffic. It is also the incongruity of everything – ox drawn carts alongside the latest cars; beggars outside 5 star hotels; shopping malls with western stores such as KFC, Marks & Spencer and H&M alongside pavement sellers or people crushing sugar cain to sell as energy drinks. Also, imagine a world in which there is no NHS (all treatment needs to be paid for), no free schooling (all education needs to be paid for), no unemployment, disability or any other kind of benefit.

When I was there recently, I was asked by one of the members of the church why I am prepared to leave the comfort of the west and come to such a different kind of culture. I told her my story of how God had opened up the way and given us connections which had made it possible, but I don't think I really answered the question. The answer is that God has called us to be part of a bigger world than the one we inhabit. It is the world of the Kingdom and incorporates people from every race, tribe, tongue and nation. Whilst my encounter with Indians may at times be a clash of cultures requiring sensitivity and accommodation, the one place we are united is in Christ Jesus. This supersedes all barriers and enables us to receive one another as equals – brothers and sisters in Christ.


things through Christ who gives me strength." Philippians 4:13

Act Justly, Love Mercy, Walk Humbly. Micah 6:8

On 5<sup>th</sup> April I will be flying out to Dakar, Senegal as a volunteer with Mercy Ships where for 3 weeks I will be working with the dental team in an off-ship dental clinic in Case Foyer, Sanglakam.

Mercy Ships was founded in 1978 and is a faith-based international development organisation following the 2000 year old model of Jesus by "bringing hope and healing to the forgotten poor", helping people of all faiths and none. Operating the largest charity—run hospital ship in the world they deliver free, vital medical care to some of the world's least developed countries. This floating hospital is staffed almost entirely by volunteers from up to 40 nations who give their time and expertise for free to help treat dental and eye problems, cleft lips and palates, tumours, club feet , child birth injuries and various other conditions.

During the Africa Mercy's 10-month stay in Dakar, Mercy Ships plans to provide 1,700 life-changing surgeries onboard and to treat over 3,400 at a land-based dental clinic. Volunteers also work closely with host nations to improve the way healthcare is delivered across the country, by training and mentoring local medical staff, and renovating hospitals and clinics. All of this is provided at no cost to the recipients and will help to improve the healthcare provision in Senegal long after the ship leaves port.

Mercy Ships doesn't just take doctors and nurses – the ship is a small city, with cooks, teachers, receptionists, mechanics, IT specialists, engineers and cleaners. There are around 400 volunteers on the hospital ship at any one time and 1,000 serve onboard throughout the year.

I feel very privileged to be able to join Mercy Ships this year and hope to be able to share my experiences with you when I return.
