
Setting the Captives Free: Notes from a Prison Chaplain

The contrast between good and bad is something I experience each day in prison. The evil things men have done. The evil things that are happening in the prison. It does scare me, but that is not a bad thing, it means that I am on my guard and make wise decisions.

I am experiencing some dark things and it starts to overwhelm me and get me down, then something good happens and I know why I am there. One day I had a tough time in a group, with men trying to be manipulative. Then a man whom I had previously refused to talk to due to his aggression, came to light a candle for a relative who had died. It was an honour to spend that time with him, he was vulnerable, wanting prayer, he and then surprised me at the end by giving me a quick hug. That made my day, the group faded into insignificance.

Another man is too scared to leave the wing due to being stabbed in prison He is reading the bible and is going to discuss what he has read with me. Another was a non believer but wanted support so asked for chaplaincy to see him. He is now reading the bible, coming to Sunday services and another group and is close to making a commitment. These are a few of the things that make it worthwhile.

Good does triumph over evil. Light replaces darkness. Love is stronger that hate. God gave me a picture of a dark stormy night sky, sinister, foreboding. Then the clouds started to clear and I could see a black sky. As I continued to look I saw a star and another star. Eventually all the clouds cleared and I could see a beautiful night sky filled with stars. God says that there will be lights being switched on in the men. The prison will be filled with men who are connected to him. Please continue to pray for God to work in prison. I love you all and miss you when I am not with you on a Sunday. Angie
